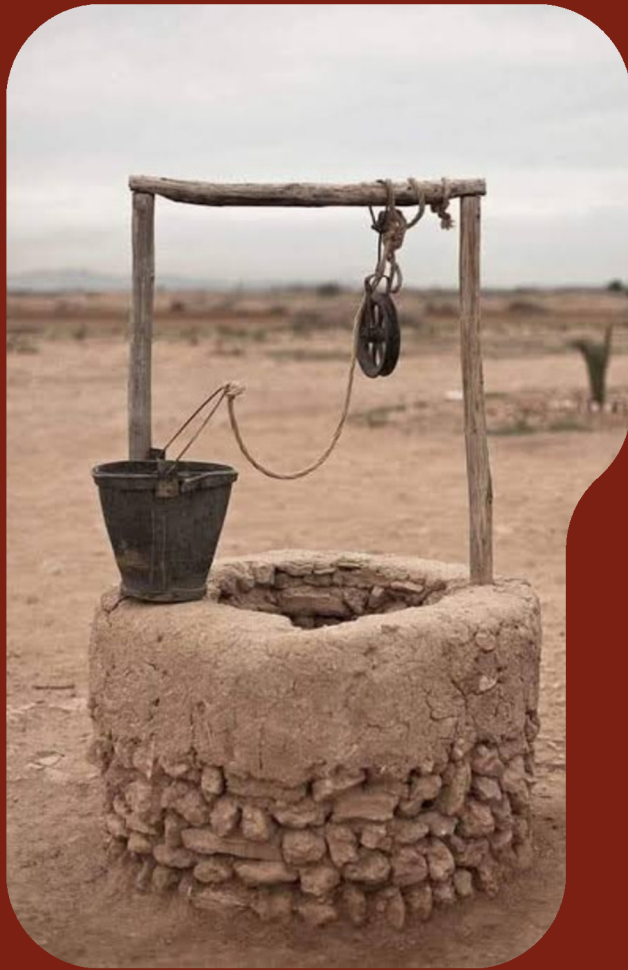

Prophet Yusuf's dream (12:4) is a summary of his destiny. Imam Rāzī explains:

- True dreams (ru'yā ṣādiqa) are divine signs.

- Prophetic foresight: The dream sets the stage for the entire surah.

 Modern reflection: Even in difficulty, we can serve. Your “prison” may be the platform Allah chose for your impact.


Divine Timing

One of imam Rāzī's recurring themes is the verse:
"Allah is predominant over His affair..." (12:21)

- Human plotting ≠ divine will: Yusuf's brothers planned evil, but Allah's plan prevailed.
- Delays are preparation: Yusuf's rise came after years of hardship — each step was necessary.

 Modern reflection: When life feels delayed or unfair, remember: Allah is preparing you for something greater.

Prophet Yusuf's resistance to the seduction of the nobleman's wife is a moral high point. Imam Rāzī explores:

- Taqwā as shield: Yusuf immediately sought Allah's refuge.
- Sudden divine aid: "He saw the proof of his Lord" — a flash of spiritual clarity.
- Resisting sin: The greater the temptation, the greater the reward for resisting.
